



### Letter from the Vicarage

If you could have a month named after you which one would it be? Which month would most reflect who you think you are? I think for me the month of David would have to be what we now call April. I see myself as essentially optimistic and a glass half full kind of person and someone who loves the new and revels in change and adventure. So to my mind April is the month that reflects that — nature's optimistic month that brings in the new year of growth and renewal. So I fully expect that next year we will go March, David, May. How about you, what month are you going to claim?

The reason I mention this as we start August is that August is one of only two months that is actually named after someone – in this case the Emperor Augustus. As I mentioned last year in this newsletter he chose this month because it was the month in which he celebrated his most famous military victories and the Roman Senate were happy to bow to his vanity. If Trump carries on as he is no doubt the US Senate will vote to change the name of November to Trump or Trumpember or Trumply to celebrate his election triumph before too long.

There can be few greater demonstrations of power that the power to change the calendar. Augustus's immediate predecessor Julius Caesar reorganised the whole year and gave his name to the subsequent 'Julian' calendar (and the month of July) that then defined 'time' for much for the world for over 1600 years. It was the church, Pope Gregory XIII in fact, that adjusted it in 1582 to account for the fact that the Julian calendar had the year length very slightly out so there had been 'drift' in the seasons such as Easter and the equinoxes were clearly out of whack. While this 'new' Gregorian calendar has been adopted globally in civil society there are still parts of the Orthodox Church that use the Julian calendar for religious purposes.

So both Julius and Augustus held power over the way we name and count time. Four years after Augustus renamed his month a baby was born in Bethlehem that held the ultimate power over time because he was the creator of it in the first place. Jesus didn't change months or calendars but he changed humanity's relationship with God and so with time itself. The power that Jesus displayed broke down the gap between the temporal and the eternal – between the mortal and immortal. In his death and resurrection Jesus offered us the gift of stepping outside time and activating an eternal relationship with God. That's power that Julius and Augustus could not even have dreamed of having.

And it's a power that is offered to each and every one of us. Having months named after us is a mere bagatelle compared with having God name you as one of his own and give you the power of not being bound by time, that is to become a timeless creature.

And here is the WI Report from July, which the editor apologises for missing out in the last edition!

The title 'Witches, Scolds and Mouldy Jades' belied a fascinating and well-researched talk from Amy Moore who packed in so much information in for us to digest. The talk was based on her PhD thesis studied over four years as a mature student. Such thorough research was undertaken at the Centre for Oxfordshire Studies in Cowley (always worth a visit) and in the Bodleian library. Amy delved into the lives of women between 1575 and 1640. Oxford's population of 5,000 in 1575 rose to 10,000 by 1640 when freemen, churchwardens and the judiciary presided over local business. Whilst as children we all read in history books about the scold's bridle and the ducking stool (which often rotted) it seems there was only one instance of this taking place in Oxford in this timeframe 'Mouldy Jades' refers to old horses or nags - gossiping women! Such thorough research was much-appreciated.

We also had a flourishing produce table and a flower raffle.

Not only do we have interesting talks but we have had two delightful walks - Tiddington to Waterperry with tea and Great Milton and Great Haseley with lunch. Another walk is proposed for the 23rd June. Our outing is planned for 18th August and names were taken. Our new venture, craft afternoons, was well supported on the 10th June. A theatre visit is also to look forward to. We will also hold a stall at the village BBQ on 1st August. So, WI is not just about meetings - spin offs are also varied and of interest.



### **Breaking News**

### Holton Village Hall is: 'Going Solar'

As part of the Village Hall's Environmental Strategy 'Fit<sup>4</sup>50' we are planning to be self-sufficient for electrical energy in 2026 by installing Solar Panels.



The Key Features will be:

20 Solar Panels (13 on the South Elevation, 7 on the East Elevation)
8 MW of Electrical Power generated per year
95% independence from the electricity grid
70% Electricity export to grid to provide an income stream
£1000 saving in electricity costs each year
2000kg reduction in CO<sub>2</sub> emissions

Implementation Cost: £13,000

A Planning Application was submitted to South Oxfordshire on the 18<sup>th</sup> June 2025 and a grant application to cover **50**% of the cost will be submitted on the 25<sup>th</sup> July 2025.


